## ➔ Fund Overview

**Daintree Wind Farm Ltd** has committed **£12,000** each year into a community Fund, which is split equally between the Parishes of Crick and Kilsby in Northamptonshire.

- Grants between £250 and £6,000
- Closing date: **8th April 2026**
- Final decisions: End of June 2026

Projects must be located within the Parishes of Crick or Kilsby.

## ➔ Who can apply?

Eligible Organisations, who can apply for funding include:

- Voluntary, community groups
- Parish Councils
- Schools and educational establishments
- Social enterprises, provided they operate on a not-for-profit basis and have minimum of three unrelated directors.

## ➔ What can be funded?

Priority will be given to:

- Energy efficiency or renewable energy projects, such as insulation, efficient boilers or small scale renewable energy installations
- Training or education projects, especially vocational training for unemployed young people under the age of 25 years old
- Projects for school age children, or older people
- Any other community projects for the benefit of residents of the local area

# Kilsby Parish Council

## Chairman's Annual Report

Happy New Year to all Kilsby residents, I do hope you all had a lovely time and enjoyed time with your families.

### Highways

The Parish Council continues to work with West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) Highways to address ongoing concerns about speeding and parking within the village and are endeavouring to tackle issues where we are able to do so.

The Council has received a significant number of complaints regarding vehicles parking on grass verges throughout the village. These verges are the responsibility of West Northamptonshire Council, meaning the Parish Council must obtain their permission before taking any action or making improvements, such as resurfacing or installing bollards. At present, WNC are unwilling to take action themselves or grant permission for the Parish Council to make changes. We therefore encourage any residents who are unhappy about this situation to contact WNC directly, so that the strength of local feeling can be fully appreciated.

We are pleased to confirm that the zig-zag lines outside the school are now enforceable. Parents and caregivers have been advised and reminded of the importance of safe and considerate parking at school drop-off and pick-up times. Enforcement Officers will be in attendance to help ensure compliance.

Cllr Palmer, the Parish Council's Police Liaison, has been working closely with the local PCSO on issues such as parking on pavements. Encouragingly, there appears to have been a reduction in incidents following this campaign, and we thank residents for their cooperation.

### Speed watch

We are grateful to those volunteers who have come forward to help resurrect the village Speedwatch initiative. However, more volunteers are still needed, as the scheme requires a minimum of ten participants to operate. If you are interested in taking part, please contact the Parish Clerk.

### Kilsby House

The Parish Council has been in contact with contractors working on the Kilsby House development to try to find solutions to issues caused by construction vehicles in and around the area. While some measures have been put

in place, problems do persist, and we will continue to engage with the developers to address these concerns.

### Butts Lane

The path at Butts Lane has now been completed, along with the necessary tree works, and we hope residents will benefit from these improvements. The Council is currently considering moving the village book swap from the telephone box to ensure clear and easy access to the defibrillator. Ideas include installing a cabinet on Butts Lane, if you have any suggestions for a suitable new location, please contact the Parish Clerk.

### Planning.

As always, the Parish Council continues to consider and, where appropriate, object to unsuitable planning applications. We urge residents to keep an eye on Parish Council agendas for upcoming planning matters and to submit any comments or objections directly to West Northamptonshire Council via their online planning portal.

### Welcome Packs.

The village welcome pack has recently been updated. Cllr Tony Kerr is the contact if you would like a copy. An electronic version will also be added to the Parish Council website. If you have a new neighbour, please let us know and we will endeavour to ensure they receive a welcome pack.

### Kilsby School.

We are delighted to share that Kilsby Primary School pupils have designed new signs for the Recreation Ground and surrounding areas, reminding residents and visitors to pick up after their dogs and not to litter. These signs will be installed shortly, and the Parish Council would like to thank the children for their hard work and creativity — we're sure you'll agree they look fantastic.

### New Projects and Village Grants.

The Parish Council continues to consider a range of projects for the village in the year ahead, and we look forward to working with residents to help improve and support our community. If any village organisation would like to apply for a grant from the council, please do get in touch with Emma our clerk who would be pleased to let you have the necessary application form.

Well, that's about all for now and if you wondered why I'm still around, it's because our house move hit problems and whilst we were very disappointed, the upside is, I'm still about for now and able to enjoy my walks around our village.

# News from your West Northants Councillors

*An Update from Your West Northants Councillors –*

*Cllr Rosie Humphreys & Cllr Andrew Simpson*

## 1. Council News

### a.) WNC Budget 2026/27

At time of publication consultation will have closed on WNC's draft budget proposals for 2026/27. Although elected in May 2025 this is the first budget from the new Reform UK administration so we will be interested to see how much they change anything because of the public consultation.

The key headlines are:

- Council Tax is proposed to increase by the maximum allowed of 4.99% (taking the Council's average charge for a band D equivalent property to £1,960.14 per year).
- Key areas requiring additional spend are Adult Social Care (£22.7m), Children's Services (£9m) and Central Services (£11m). The first two have been driven by increasing demand and costs whilst the third is to support the administrations capital spend and borrowing.
- Around £25m of savings have been identified to balance the budget.
- A number of fees and charges are being increased with proposals to introduce car parking charges in Daventry, Towcester and Brackley WNC car parks.
- Increase garden waste collection subscriptions by £20 per annum
- Total council expenditure is c£459m for 2026/27 (excludes ring fenced schools budget of £552m).
- It is worth noting that Adult Social Care and Children's Services takes up c58% of the council's expenditure.

We are working with our colleagues in the Lib Dem Group to put forward alternative proposals when the final budget goes to be agreed at the Full Council meeting on 26th February.

### b.) New Local Development Plan

At time of publication the council should have gone out to public consultation on the final version of its Local Development. This will guide development across West Northamptonshire up to 2043.

In terms of the impact on Kilsby the draft plan has included a review of the village confines and categorised the village as a 'Secondary Service Village'.

There are several other changes from the previous draft plans and in particular there is now a 'Rural Area Housing Requirement' which sets out what growth is needed

to provide an additional c3,800 homes in the West Northants rural area. This growth being provided from Primary or Secondary Service Villages from within their confines (where possible).

The proposal is that this is led by the Neighbourhood Plan or a Development Plan Document for each of the villages impacted.

For Kilsby there is now a minimum additional requirement of 62 new houses being provided by the end of the plan period (2043).

We are challenging this change as it no longer appears to be based on a local housing needs assessment or the existing Neighbourhood Development Plans. How the numbers for each village have been arrived at uses a complex formula and needs explaining. Also, the proposed requirement for Neighbourhood Development Plans to be reviewed to accommodate the minimum housing numbers currently comes with no additional resources to support a review.

### c) Review of Blue Badge Scheme

Rosie is leading a working group looking at issues raised by the Lib Dems motion to Full Council in November which highlighted problems with badge renewals requiring extensive information to be provided. Please provide us with any feedback of your experience of the current scheme.

## 2. Local News

### a) Rugby Local Plan – Final Consultation & Submission

Rugby Borough Council is also consulting on the final version of its local plan which is up to 2042.

We are delighted to see that the new version significantly protects the Rainsbrook Valley by removing previous development sites off Kilsby Lane at Hillmorton and off Barby Lane. The plan now focuses more on using brownfield land and adding enhanced protections which is a change heavily influenced by public consultation and local advocacy against housing proposals in the valley, though new development will still occur nearby, like 250 homes opposite Houlton. The Rainsbrook Valley is now designated as a 'landscape of elevated sensitivity'. This gives it some added protection when considering development options.

Rosie and Andrew are to meet with WNC Planning Officers to see if a similar designation can be agreed for the WNC side of the valley.

**b) Planning Application No. 2025/5290 Land to the rear of 6 to 54 Rugby Road (Rainier Developments) for 63 Houses**

This application was published on the WNC Planning portal just before Christmas, but a number of errors were made when it was posted. The application will be decided by the Non-Strategic Planning Committee and the deadline for comments has gone back (at time of writing to 5th February) Based on current timelines it would go to a committee meeting later in the year – the earliest is potentially 9th April. We will keep you updated of any changes to this.

**c) DIRFT IV**

Prologis are moving ahead with a proposed expansion of DIRFT to the east of the M1 details can be seen at [www.prologis.co.uk](http://www.prologis.co.uk).

**d) Cadman Sporting/Barby Gun Club**

a) WNC have now heard back from the applicants' agents who are in a position to formally submit additional documentation on ecology and highways. These are expected shortly and once reviewed the council will launch full formal consultation.

# Gardeners' Corner

## Confusion

Hot? Cold? Dry? Wet? It's so difficult to describe the last few weeks, we seem to have had some of everything. The lovely Daventry Country Park reservoir went from empty to overflowing in what felt like a week.

## Watch out for frosts

If you have tender plants do watch for hard frosts and protect with fleece or even newspaper. You don't need to peg the newspaper down, because if it's windy it won't be frosty.

## Get those secateurs out

A cold clear February day, with the ground hard, is an ideal time to prune your apple and pear trees whilst they are still dormant. (Leave plums and other stone fruit until much later when they have started growing.)

## The basic rules of pruning:

- Flower buds are fat and rounded
- Leaf buds are thin and pointed
- The harder you cut the more it grows
- "If your tree's about right then pruning is light"

Don't cut off anything ending in a flower bud: You'll get no fruit! Then follow three simple steps:-

1. Cut out any dead or diseased wood.
2. Reduce side shoots that end in leaf buds to 2 or 3 side buds. (To encourage development of fruit spurs)
3. Reduce last year's growth of leaders that end in leaf buds by one third (Less if the leader is strong, more if it's weak)

## Jobs to do in February

- Clean your pots and greenhouse ready for the season
- Divide up any perennials that are too large

## Jobs to do in March

- Stake and tie any plant liable to be damaged by March winds
- Sow tomatoes in trays or pots on a windowsill
- Prune your roses when the hardest frost risk is past

**Dear Friends and Neighbours, we need your support again please.**

## PLANNING APPLICATION RUGBY RD

As many of you will know an application has been made to build 63 houses behind Rugby Rd in green space. We published details because the concern was that the last date for objections was early January.

It is now confirmed that objections can be submitted up to 13th Feb so we would be grateful if you haven't already made an objection that you use this time to do so.

The application can be found on the WNC portal <https://wnc.planning-register.co.uk/Planning/Display/2025/5290/MAO>

There are many reasons to object but if you want to discuss further please contact us by emailing [www.kilsbyaction@gmail.com](mailto:kilsbyaction@gmail.com) or message 07952 404305 and we will come back to you.

Building in green space outside the village confines without a rural exception is not permitted and is specifically contrary to the current Local Plan and the Kilsby Neighbourhood Plan. The access is extremely dangerous and the ridge and furrow is one of the best examples in the area and should not be ploughed up for developers profits. The green space should be preserved in order that Kilsby retains its identity as a village.

## WNC DRAFT LOCAL PLAN UP TO 2043

In terms of the impact on Kilsby the draft plan has included a review of the village confines and categorised the village as a 'Secondary Service Village' – this is very good news.

There is now a 'Rural Area Housing Requirement' which sets out what growth is needed to provide an additional c3,800 homes in the rural area. This growth being provided from Primary or Secondary Service Villages within their boundaries. If WNC enforce this it will be good news, but developers will try to work round it.

The proposal is that this is led by the Neighbourhood Plan or a Development Plan Document for each of the villages impacted. More good news!

For Kilsby there is now a minimum additional requirement of 62 houses being provided by the end of the plan period (2043). BAD NEWS!

The requirement no longer appears to be based on a local housing needs assessment or existing Neighbourhood Development Plans VERY BAD NEWS!

KAG is attending a consultation briefing in early Feb and will report back, we will keep you notified but we need everyone to participate in the consultation exercise with WNC, and we will keep you updated on how to do that.

# Ginger and Honey Cake

*Recipe by Jenny Moore*

This recipe is a cake that brings back happy memories of sitting in KATHY BROWN'S garden which she used to open to visitors, and then provide tea and cake at the end of the tour.

**A cake that is enjoyed by all the family.**

## Ingredients:

**8oz of margarine or butter**

**8oz of castor sugar**

**4 eggs**

**8oz sifted self-raising flour**

**2 level teaspoons of baking powder**

**2 level teaspoons of ginger powder**

## Method:

Cream margarine/butter and sugar together beat in eggs one at a time, then add flour baking powder and ginger. Bake in two 8 inch tins in a moderate oven. Cool then split the sponges to make 4 layers.

Filling. Hand mix 4oz of cold cream cheese plus 4oz of soft unsalted butter with 2 tsp of ginger powder and 2tbs of honey (the ginger and honey can be adjusted according to taste). Using equal amounts layer filling between cakes adding 1tsp of crystallised ginger in the middle layer

Mix 6oz of icing sugar with 1tsp of ginger powder and a little water to make icing. Spread over top of cake and you could add 1tsp of crystallised ginger

# Climate Matters

The weather this year globally has been somewhat wild. Since the last edition of this column, severe flooding in Indonesia has killed more than 600 people. Whilst writing, bush fires in Australia have consumed an area the size of London, destroying at least 300 properties with at least one person reported killed. The Himalayas are now bare and rocky after a lack of snowfall at a time when they should be snow covered. What little snow that remains is melting quickly due to rising temperatures. The reduction in ice and snow will not only change how the Himalayas look, it will also impact the lives of hundreds of millions of people and many ecosystems in the region. As temperatures rise in spring, snow accumulated during winter melts and the runoff feeds river systems. This snowmelt is a crucial source for the region's rivers and streams, supplying water for drinking, irrigation and hydropower.

Countries are now starting to plan for a high temperature future. Spain plans to open a network of climate shelters in public buildings before next summer, to provide refuge from the heat. So far there is no sign of the UK planning ahead for such a situation, even though the Government's lead climate adviser has declared that the rising temperatures in the UK have become the new norm.

Although published statistics show that the UK has had its sunniest and hottest year on record, globally the year was not as hot as 2024 when the significant threshold of 1.5C above pre-industrial times was breached. This in itself is concerning as the Pacific Ocean El Nina phenomenon which provides a cooling effect was active. In essence, even though there was a temperature decline, the temperature was above what might be expected.

In the UK we have had storm Claudia which led to severe flooding in Wales with Monmouth particularly badly affected, and storm Goretti which brought high winds, travel disruption and for some, deep snow. The recent extended cold snap has reminded me that, although we think of global warming leading to high temperatures, there is an alternative scenario which worries scientists, that North West Europe could enter into significant cooling. The Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation current moves heat from the tropics to the poles. It is driven by dense, cold salt containing water moving northwards becoming saltier as it cools and which sinks near the Arctic, starting the deep ocean return flow south. Now scientists have found that glacial run off is causing the salt content to decline so weakening the current. The

Gulf Stream is the local part of this system and it is what keeps northwestern Europe warm at the high latitudes where we reside. It is known that the Gulf Stream is slowing down with concerns it could stop altogether. In the UK this would drop average temperatures by around 3.5C and in continental western Europe by as much as 10C to 15C.



Harsher and more extreme winter conditions would occur particularly across northern areas of Britain, with snow accumulating at levels that the country would struggle to deal with. Elsewhere the southern hemisphere would become warmer. All this would lead to ecological and agricultural changes impacting the whole globe leading to food insecurity for billions.

So what is happening locally? Northamptonshire County Association of Local Councils have implemented a scheme of Climate and Environment Champions. The Climate and Nature Champion acts as the local council's key point of contact and advocate for environmental sustainability, biodiversity, and climate resilience. This voluntary role supports the council in identifying, promoting and coordinating local action on climate and nature matters. A bit like KRCAG but at a higher level. Kilsby Parish Council has appointed Cheryl Sibley as Champion who will be supported by Ian Massey as Deputy Champion. Both will report back to the Council and also to KRCAG.

Following on from Kilsby's visit to Sherbourne Recycling, Yelvertoft PC are arranging a visit of their own. They have invited Kilsby to join if numbers allow and 2 residents have been able to secure a visit before all places were taken.

KRCAG has also contacted the Youth Club Leader and it is planned to meet with the Club now that the holiday festivities are over. It is intended to have a short workshop session to find out how younger people and their families view climate change, collate their thoughts and provide feedback at a subsequent session.
